



When our boys were young, they loved to open the little windows on the Advent calendar. Katy always found the most creative Advent calendars at the bookstore in our little town. The ones I remember best featured a painting of the nativity scene with placid cows, alert donkeys, and reverent wise men gathered around the manger.

Each day the boys were allowed to open one of the paper windows. They took turns because they both wanted to be the one who would reveal the tiny picture inside the paper flap. Each day they learned a little more of the Christmas story. We all loved the slow buildup of

anticipation as the windows revealed more and more of the story. When we finally reached Christmas Eve, the boys were more than ready for Christmas (and so were we!).

Anticipation is the theme of Advent. The word Advent means 'coming.' We're anticipating the coming of Christ. Just as Mary waited during her nine months of pregnancy for the baby Jesus to be born, Advent calls us to anticipate the coming of Christ. We anticipate the coming of Christ in three ways: in the annual celebration of Christ's birth on Christmas Day; in the hearts of believers; and in the Second Coming of Christ at the end of the age.

I don't know about you, but I need to be reminded that Christ comes into our hearts. Just as the baby Jesus was born in a stable two thousand years ago, Christ is born in our hearts every Christmas Eve. That's the purpose of

Advent, to remind us that Christ is continually coming into our hearts.

In the Episcopal Church, we're quite restrained in our celebration of Advent and Christmas. We don't plunge into Christmas carols and Christmas decorations the day after Thanksgiving, but we hold back. We remember the words of the prophets who were waiting expectantly for the Messiah, and we remember John the Baptist who prepared the way for Jesus.

I hope this Advent will be a joyful anticipation of the coming of Christ for all of us at St. Germain's and for the whole world. —Bill

Longevity Class: Improve health



As my plane flew east into the darkness of an early November evening, I thought how my travel path is similar to the season of advent. As we head farther into the darkness, we can only hope for the light. Below me the streets are outlined by lamps, and the beams of a thousand cars' headlights shine on the freeway. As beautiful as this sight is, the man-made light is artificial and it's glow unreal; no replacement for longer days of sunlight.

The physical lack of daylight, certainly a problem for those of us living close to the 45th parallel, mimics a lack of light in our spiritual lives.
