THE VICAR'S BRAIN - Rev. Bill Fulton

The first time I voted, at age 19, I was in college. Despite wracking my brain, I cannot remember where I cast my first vote. Was it in an armory? A school gym? A church hall? I hope you remember your first voting experience better than I do.

I think of voting as a vast privilege. When I vote, I participate in the sweep of history. My voice is heard. I join the throng of multitudes to influence the

course of our nation. Even though I am only one person, my vote makes a difference.

In a representative democracy, every person has one vote, and the candidate or issue with the most votes wins the election. That simple principle makes our representatives and our institutions responsive to us. If we don't like our representatives, we can vote the rascals out!

I was taught in civics class long ago that one of the most solemn and weighty responsibilities we have as citizens is to vote. A democracy won't last if its citizens are apathetic or lazy. Voting is a high privilege, one that many people in the world don't have.

I guess what I'm saying is, make sure you vote in the upcoming election. It matters!

I read recently that some churches are holding events to promote one or the other of the presidential candidates in the election next month. If true, this is strictly against the rules of the Internal Revenue Service.

If a church endorses a political candidate, its tax-exemption status can be revoked. A church may endorse an issue or a cause, but not a candidate. So you'll never hear me endorse a candidate for office from the pulpit.

Besides, I know you're a thoughtful, committed citizen with a good brain that can figure out for yourself who is the best candidate. And I know you'll do your research so you can make a well-informed decision.

So I hope you'll exercise your God-given right to vote in the upcoming election. You'll be glad you did!

It's that time of year. The leaves from our few deciduous trees are changing color and dropping along with the temperature. And Episcopal churches are asking members to recommit their support for our congregations. When we talk about support and sharing our resources, we use the phrase "time, talent and treasure." Although most of us focus on the treasure, carefully evaluating how much money we can afford to give, perhaps using the traditional tithe (ten percent), I ask everyone to consider the equally if not more important sharing of talent and time. As most of our congregants are in our golden years (aka old as dirt, Methuselah years, senior, etc.), we might not feel that we can contribute much time or talent due to health issues, or conflicting needs of our families, or other reasons. But something Father Bill recently said hit me. When talking about the Eucharist, he reminded us that we use bread, because a loaf of bread represents the unity of the church with Christ. When that bread is broken into smaller pieces and shared it continues to represent the whole. Every crumb has purpose and binds us together.

This made me think that even if we can only share one hour a week (outside of worship), when added to the one hour of others, our loaf of time can become quite filling. Or even if we can only bake one dozen cookies for a bake sale, or give one can of food to the food bank, when we do these small acts, combined with others, we can change the world for the better.

The other piece of wisdom Father Bill shared that helped me decide to write this, was the Biblical words of Paul in his second letter to the Corinthians. "Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

As we discern what commitments we will make in the coming year to St. Germain's, the Episcopal church and our body of Christ in the next year, I hope everyone will take time to reflect that this giving creates abundance. Not just for ourselves, for we do reap what we sow, but for the entire world. We will change the world, bringing the light of Christ into a full spectrum, when we commit what we are able to, and do so with a loving, cheerful heart.
