THE VICAR'S BRAIN - Rev. Bill Fulton



On New Year's Eve, our neighbors invited us to a bonfire in their yard. When we arrived about 10:30 pm, this delightful young couple and their seven-year-old daughter were gathered around a fire pit with a dozen or so of their young friends. Someone was strumming a guitar, there were adult beverages and marshmallows on sticks, and the firelight drew us all into a cozy circle.

Veronica, our host, asked us if we'd like to participate in her New Year's Eve ritual. She had gathered bundles of tall grass, sage, laurel branches, and dried weeds for everyone to make their bundle of hope for the New Year, tied up with a piece of twine. She also provided small pieces of paper and a pen.

We wrote our regrets for 2024 on the paper and dropped them into a fire pot to watch them go up in smoke. Then we took our bundles of hope and threw them into the bonfire. Everyone in the circle murmured in approval or cheered as each person thrust their bundle into the fire.

Veronica said she created this ritual because she wanted their New Year celebration to be meaningful. I think it was a very creative way to be intentional about entering the new year.

It made me wonder if there is an equivalent ritual in the church. Perhaps the "Renewal of our Baptismal Covenant" that we recite several times a year, but it seems so drab and rote compared to a bonfire. I wonder if we could make it more intentional.

Young people are looking for rituals that give meaning to their lives. I applaud them for that. But I also remember the rituals established by the church which provide such a depth of meaning. The Eucharist which plunges us into the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection. The Sacrament of Baptism which signifies our new life in Christ.

I cherish our rituals. To me they give great meaning and comfort, and I hope I'll never let them become bland or boring.

What is Epiphany?



The feast of the Epiphany is January 6th, twelve days after Christmas. Epiphany means "manifestation" or "revelation" or "appearing". It makes sense that Epiphany season comes right after Christmas. Christmas is about the birth of Jesus; Epiphany is about the spread of the good news to the wider world.

The Feast of the Epiphany centers on the arrival of the Magi in Bethlehem. In the Christmas story that St. Matthew tells us, wise men from the East study the stars and the prophecies, and detect the birth of the Savior. They travel to Bethlehem to pay homage to Jesus Christ, and they bring with them gifts of frankincense, gold, and myrrh. The Gospel account doesn't say that there are three magi, nor that they are kings. Over the years, our Christian ancestors described them as three kings named Balthesar, Melchior, and Caspar (although in different cultures they have different names!)

During the Season of Epiphany, we strive to be more mindful of the world around us, and to realize our call to carry the Light of Christ and make it known in our homes, in our places of work and leisure, in our towns and countries, and beyond. The liturgical color of the season is green, representing the green things of God's earth and referring to growth of the Spirit of God within us in response to His coming at Christmas.
