THE VICAR'S BRAIN - Rev. Bill Fulton



I have a fond memory of a Palm Sunday years ago when my two sons were small boys. Father John, our lovable priest who was somewhat zany and absent-minded, organized our Palm Sunday procession around the block. Father John, in his vestments, played the guitar and led us in singing "The King of Glory," while our boys in acolyte robes carried the cross and a torch in front of him, wobbling under their weight. The congregation, waving limp palms good-naturedly, straggled behind.

In our small Alaska town, the streets were gravel with a fine sediment that worked its way up into the bottoms of your pants. I remember worrying about the hem of the acolytes' white robes that were getting muddier every step. They didn't even notice, but it's what sticks in my mind when I think of that day.

Palm Sunday is the Church's way of concentrating the events of Holy Week into one service. On Palm Sunday, we read the Passion Gospel as a drama to tell the story of Jesus' last days on earth: his entry into Jerusalem, his last supper with the disciples, his betrayal, arrest, and trial, and finally his crucifixion and burial.

The reason we read the Passion Gospel is so that if you can't get to Maundy Thursday or Good Friday services, you still get to hear the Passion story on Sunday. Otherwise we might arrive at the joy of Easter Day without having given any thought to Jesus' suffering and death. The road to Easter has to go right through Good Friday, or it loses its meaning.

Palm Sunday begins with a joyful procession to remember Jesus's entry into Jerusalem, and it ends on a somber note with the burial of Jesus' body. So I think it would be fitting if we mirrored that approach in our worship. Let's begin with a joyful parade starting outside the church and slowly become more subdued as we go through the service, ending with a quiet and solemn, almost whispered, Eucharist.

May your Holy Week and Easter be memorable and meaningful.



Palm Sunday - The Sunday of the Passion April 13 at 10:30 a.m.



Join us for a joyous celebration of Palm Sunday, marking the beginning of Holy Week and the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. The liturgy of the palms is the entrance rite for the service. The congregation gathers and process to the church after the blessing of the palms. The liturgy of the palms includes a reading of one of the gospel accounts of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem. All the people hold branches in their hands during

the procession. The Passion gospel is read with specific roles assigned to different persons, with the congregation taking the part of the crowd.

Good Friday - God dies on the Cross April 18 at Noon



The Friday before Easter Day, on which the church commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus. It is a day of fasting and special acts of discipline and self-denial. The liturgy of the day includes John's account of the Passion gospel, a solemn form of intercession known as the solemn collects. Copies of the Passion Gospel and a sign-up sheet for parts are available in the parish hall.



Easter Lilies are a meaningful way to remember or honor loved ones. The meaning of the Easter lily is tied the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The trumpet shape of the Easter lily represent the trumpets that announced his resurrection.

Also called the "white robed apostles of hope", Easter lilies are believed to have sprouted many times throughout Christian stories. Lilies with white blossoms are available for \$10 per plant. The deadline for placing orders is Sunday, April 13.

EASTER SUNDAY, APRIL 20



Easter is the celebration of Christ's resurrection from the dead. It is celebrated on Sunday, April 20th and marks the end of Holy Week and is the beginning of the holy season for the liturgical year.

As we know from the Gospels, Jesus Christ rose from the dead on the third day following his crucifixion, which would be Sunday. His resurrection marks the triumph of good over evil, sin, and death. It is the singular event, which proves that those who trust in God and accept Christ, will be raised from the dead.

Since Easter represents the fulfillment of God's promises to humankind, it is the most important holiday on the Christian calendar. In the Episcopal Church, Easter is a celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, which is considered to be the central event in Christian theology.

On Easter Sunday, we gather to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ with great joy and exuberance. The Easter Sunday service typically includes special music, and the singing of hymns that proclaim the triumph of Christ over death. The service also includes a reading of the Easter story from the Gospel of John, which tells of the discovery of the empty tomb by Mary Magdalene and the other disciples.

Throughout the Easter season, which lasts for 50 days, Episcopalians continue to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ through prayer, worship, and acts of kindness and charity.

Following the Easter Sunday service, we will have our annual Easter potluck!

O God, who for our redemption gave your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross, and by his glorious resurrection delivered us from the power of our enemy: Grant us so to die daily to sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his resurrection; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.
