

THE VICAR'S BRAIN - Rev. Bill Fulton



I have a love-hate relationship with the season of Lent. I love it because it's gutsy, demanding, and stern. Lent is tough love. It asks us to give something up, to dig deeper, to love Jesus more. I like that.

But I hate Lent because it's all drab clothes and moony sentiment, moping around about our sins and penitence and such like. The penitence-industrial complex has made Lent into a Wal-Mart of moroseness.

So for this Lent I've decided to memorize some scripture. I know, it sounds fundamentalist. Pound some scripture verses into your brain only to forget them days later. But actually I find that memorization over a long time helps me not only retain the passage, but enter into it more deeply.

I've memorized a number of Psalms (this is an ancient and widespread Christian practice) and I find them helpful when I'm searching for the words of prayer. One of the Psalms comes to mind and I can recite the words from memory. It helps when I wake up in the middle of the night.

This Lent I plan to memorize Psalm 51, the classic Psalm of penitence that we say in the Ash Wednesday service. Okay, not all of Psalm 51, but let's say the first thirteen verses. I don't memorize as fast as I used to, so it may take me the whole season of Lent.

I challenge you to memorize some scripture or part of the service. Most of us have memorized the Lord's Prayer and half-memorized other parts of the service like the Confession, the Nicene Creed, or the Post Communion Prayer. Why not take one and just memorize it completely? It imprints it in your brain so that the words begin to work on you.

You may have other plans for Lent, and that's fine, too. But I hope you'll find some way to observe this prickly, in-your-face season. Happy Lent to you.

ASH WEDNESDAY AND LENT



Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the forty days of Lent. Christians have been preparing for the celebration of Easter by walking through a "Holy Lent" since ancient times. This is patterned after Jesus temptation in the wilderness.

Lent is a season of repentance, fasting, and self-reflection. Of course, all of this happens with the sure knowledge of God's love and grace to us through Christ. Lent and Ash Wednesday are in no way about *condemnation*. They are a time in which human beings, given a pronouncement of forgiveness and absolution through Christ, can be honest with God, with ourselves, and with each other. With the terror of judgment removed, we can speak the truth.

Ash Wednesday is the day in which Christians gather to receive the imposition of ashes. Ashes on the head have signified repentance from biblical times. Job said, "I repent in dust and ashes." Ashes are the result of burning. They remind us that we are living in this mortal world, this fallen world, and that we are made from dust, when all else is burned away. We are mortal and will return to our maker. We believe that through the death and resurrection of Christ we can be forgiven and "boldly go before the throne of grace." We feel the pain of sin and brokenness. Ash Wednesday and Lent remind us that we still live in this fallen world, and that we are a part of that fallenness. No one is free of sin. It gives us permission, in fact it calls us, to acknowledge the reality we see within ourselves, and around us. (Greg Goebel, Anglican Compass)



Early Christians observed "a season of penitence and fasting" in preparation for the Paschal feast, or Pascha. The season now known as Lent (from an Old English word meaning "spring," the time of lengthening days) has a long history. Originally, in places where Pascha was celebrat-

ed on a Sunday, the Paschal feast followed a fast of up to two days. In the third century this fast was lengthened to six days. Eventually this fast became attached to, or overlapped, another fast of forty days, in imitation of Christ's fasting in the wilderness. The forty-day fast was especially important for converts to the faith who were preparing for baptism, and for those guilty of notorious sins who were being restored to the Christian assembly. In the western church the forty days of Lent extend from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, omitting Sundays. The last three days of Lent are the sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. (BCP, p. 265).

Minutes of February Meeting

Treasurer's Report: Reviewed and discussed. John had questions about the format of the report. Donna announced she was stepping down, and we will find her replacement asap—possibly Jann Goodpaster, or use outside person (at least for the payroll portion-Carrie is working on this). We will have four people who agree to help with the Sunday collections and deposits (Kit, Amy, Peggy and Carrie volunteered). Acceptance of report moved by Kit and seconded by Carrie. Vote: aye 9, nay 0.

Review of office administration tasks. Donna provided list of tasks she has been volunteering to do for the last several years. The committee eliminated some tasks, and the remaining tasks were taken over by other committee members. A list of who does what will be generated by Amy, as she agreed to be the clerk for the BC for the following year.

Discussion about paying Donna to continue with the bulk of admin duties concluded with a motion to pay Donna \$300 each month on a provisional basis for one year. Acceptance of the motion moved by Peggy and seconded by Kit. Vote: aye 9, nay 0.

Other: Schedule of special services: Ash Wednesday service on March 5 will be at noon. Palm Sunday service is on April 13, and Good Friday service on

April 18 will be at noon. Easter is on April 20, 2025.

Next month's meeting would have been on the 19th, but due to several member's request it will be the following Wednesday, March 26th at 1 pm.

On February 26th the Bishop's Committee held their annual retreat at St. David's in Shelton.. These are the goals we have set for the coming year.

- ♦ Have more groups using our church (reach out to AA, and other service groups), possibly advertise the community center space as use for private events like parties, weddings, social gatherings
- ❖ Have an open house for local area businesses: brainstorm ways to support each other and benefit the community
- ❖ Create a study group/bible study for adult education and personal growth
- Add to our facilities (b-ball hoop, etc.) to encourage youth to use our facilities
- Host end of life seminar to include planned giving
- ❖ Offer more help to seniors: rides to church, invitations to share meals, or bring meals/groceries to those who are ill or unable to get out
- * Host job fair or trade fair to encourage a sharing of skills among our community
- ♦ Have confirmation classes at the church
- ❖ Offer tutoring to area students
